When it comes to substance use—and specifically synthetic opioids like fentanyl—there are no easy answers. Only by partnering together in families and communities to shine light on this topic can we prepare our young people and save lives. Join LCUSD and the LCF Alliance for Youth as we host speakers from DAY ONE and TACO to learn about how to identify fentanyl and its effects, as well as receive training to administer naloxone (often called by its brand name Narcan). This training will show you how to acquire Narcan and give you the knowledge and confidence to administer this life-saving medication when needed. No home should be without Narcan in the medicine cabinet.
